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Tŝilhqot'in Nation comes together to heal in response to the confirmation of 93 unmarked graves at St. Joseph's Mission in Williams Lake, British Columbia.

Williams Lake, BC: In response to the confirmation of 93 unmarked graves at St. Joseph's Mission in Williams Lake, British Columbia, at the former Indian Residential School, the Tŝilhqot'in Nation is coming together to heal and continue our work to develop our own governing body to support our children and families for a brighter future.

The 93 burials identified by ground-penetrating radar represent a survey of only a small portion of the grounds at St. Joseph's Mission (14 acres of the 470-acre site).

The Tŝilhqot'in Nation held a healing ceremony for our members this afternoon led by our Ts'iqi Dechen Jedilhtan (Tŝilhqot'in Women's Council) to honour survivors, their families and the children that did not return home. The Nation will continue to support our people to overcome the dark history and legacy of Residential Schools.

The beginning of January marked the second anniversary of the federal Bill C92 child and family legislation coming into force. Bill C92 recognizes Indigenous People's jurisdiction to legislate in the area of Indigenous child welfare. The Tŝilhqot'in Nation has been exercising our rights to self-determination and developing our own system to support our children and families.

"Once again our Nation is coming together to promote healing and support each other as we acknowledge the horrors of the Residential School system and the blatant injustice and genocide that was inflicted on Indigenous People. This investigation has only begun to scratch the surface of the atrocities that were committed at St. Joseph's Mission. It's the tip of the iceberg. Some of these burial sites are not even on that property. We need to have all Nations involved moving forward so that we can uncover the full truth. The Tŝilhqot'in Nation is a healing Nation. Our healing journey started when our Tŝilhqot'in War Chiefs gave the ultimate sacrifice for our people during the Chilcotin War of 1864/65 and the injustice and genocide we see confirmed again today at St. Joseph's Mission is the reason why our War Chiefs fought so hard to protect our people. Our Nation is committed to develop our own governing body to support our children and families here at home
